
FLYING THE GARTCONNER NEST

PTA NEWS

Over £2000 raised by local community after vandals damage

Never has it been easier to see that just one small action can make a positive change, than with the example of our very own Gartconner parent, Julie Houston!

We were all upset by the news that over the course of several months, vandals had caused significant damage to areas such as the kids play equipment, benches, AstroTurf pitches and the school garden. Because of this, coupled with the school having limited funds to make repairs, Julie was impassioned to set up a 'GoFundMe' fundraising page to try and raise some money for "our kids to be able to enjoy their playtime again."

As Julie said, "After just getting back to some normality after a year of disruption... our kids deserve a safe place to play, now more than ever before." This clearly struck a chord with everyone who read or heard about it.

Knowing that the damage caused was valued at around £2000, the target was set. What seemed at first to be a big target was within a few days seemingly in touching distance, thanks to the unprecedented response from our local community.

Julie became a minor celebrity, talking to local press and politicians about the issue and why she felt impassioned to take action! Incredibly we reached – and exceeded – our target of £2000.

In an extraordinary turn of events, with support from Councillor Stewart MacDonald, Councillor Susan Murray and Rona Mackay MSP, East Dunbartonshire Council eventually agreed to pay for the repairs and replace equipment, allowing the funds to be used in other ways to benefit our children's wellbeing.

With that in mind, Alana Callaghan, Chair of the PTA said, "We have greatly appreciated all the support from the parents/carers and the community as a whole with the vandalism matter and we are hoping that it will contribute to a larger playground project for all of the children to enjoy."

A massive thank you to everyone who played a part in making this possible – every link shared, every person told has gotten us to a point where we can make the facilities even better than they were before. The PTA will be focussing on how to make the most of the funds in the new school year. Watch this space!

PARENT COUNCIL NEWS

Latest meeting highlights

- The Sexual Health and Relationships Initiative was offered for comment.
- Learning loss: Much less significant for P1-3
 than evident from the first lockdown. P2s are
 most affected, due to disruption
 experienced at such a key stage of learning
 whilst in P1.
- Lateral flow testing is in place, twice per week for members of staff.
- Schools will submit reports for parents in the final term.
- The roof of the gym hall is being replaced as is the flooring. The MUGA pitch is to be replaced in summer.
- Concerns about privacy with the new residential development beside the school were raised. Mr Manley offered reassurance that there are always adults present to supervise in the playground. There is also a plan for a larger fence to be installed around the MUGA pitch.
- EDC has agreed to install four safety barriers on the pavement along Waterside Road to Braes of Yetts development. Traffic calming measures were also discussed.
- Possible continuity of teacher for classes in the new school year was discussed. This will be given consideration when staff joiners and leavers are clear.
- P1 for the 2021/2022 session will require 2 classes.

What is a Parent Council?

The Parent Council at Gartconner meets about four times a year and gives parents the chance to be involved in policy decisions from the school or on a local council level and address any concerns or make suggestions. All schools are required to have a Parent Council. The meetings are led by our Chair, Gartconner parent Pamela Lucas, and a main feature is the head teacher's report, where Mr Manley updates us all on what has been going on at Gartconner behind the scenes. GETTING TO KNOW YOU

For our second teacher interview, Mrs Gilmour, who teaches class P2, has kindly volunteered to answer our questions. Let's get to know her better!



For how long have you been teaching and what motivated you to become a teacher?

I have always loved working with children and knew early on that this was a career I was interested in. My mum is a teacher so I think it is in the genes! Before I became a teacher I studied illustration at Glasgow School of Art and then went on to work in a publishing house. My love for stories, writing and drawing was something I knew I would be able to explore through teaching and the creative minds of children!

What do you like best about teaching?

Teaching is a creative job where no two days are the same. I love encouraging children to be excited about learning and striving to do their best. There is nothing better than watching the light bulb go on for a child who has been working hard on something and it finally clicks.

What do you do in your free time to relax and recover from your job as a teacher?

As many will know my husband and I have a black labrador called Rupert who is my pride and joy! I love to take him out on runs and love a bit of wild swimming.

Have you ever taught a lesson that did not turn out in any way you expected it to?

Last year I had the pleasure of teaching P5 (current P6) for part of the week. We were reading the novel "Iron Man" by Ted Hughes and working on writing descriptions. Just as I was reading a chapter all about the Iron Man eating up the telephone wires and gobbling up tractors, the diggers arrived next door to start demolishing St Agatha's. This of course was not planned but perfectly timed to see what it looked like when the buildings were torn apart by the huge 'Iron' arm of the digger.

P5 produced some of the best writing that day and I nearly burst with excitement.

GARTCONNER LOVES... TO BAKE RASPBERRY AND WHITE CHOCOLATE MUFFINS!

Hopefully we are in for a summer of sun and plenty of fun outdoors, but in case of the odd rainy day, the kids could get stuck into this super easy recipe for Raspberry and White Chocolate Muffins. These tasty morsels are the best of both worlds - great for lunchboxes, but also delicious served warm with a scoop of ice-cream for dessert!


Ingredients

300g self-raising flour
150g caster sugar
1 large egg
50g vegetable oil (or sunflower oil, or olive oil)
250g milk
1 tsp vanilla extract
150g raspberries (fresh or frozen)
100g white chocolate chunks or chips



Method

Pre-heat the oven to 180°C, or 170°C if using a fan oven and line a 12 hole muffin tin with paper cases.







- In a large bowl add the caster sugar to the self-raising flour, and stir together. In a separate bowl lightly beat the egg, then add in the oil, milk and vanilla extract, and mix together.

 Pour the liquid ingredients into a well in the middle of the combined flour and sugar, and gently fold the mixture together. The batter will be slightly lumpy, take care not to over-mix.
- Gently fold through the raspberries and white chocolate. Once again, take care not to over-mix.
- Spoon the mixture into the paper cases, filling 3/3 to the top. Bake for 20-25 minutes, until lightly golden, and a skewer inserted into the muffin comes out clean. Allow to cool in the tin for 5 minutes, before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.




GARTCONNER LOVES... THE LUGGIE



The Luggie Water burn begins in North Lanarkshire and gathers pace in its final stretch in East Dunbartonshire through the old village of Waterside, to the centre of Kirkintilloch and on into the River Kelvin just north of Kirkintilloch.

The wonderful diversity of life that the Luggie supports includes plant life, fish, birds, bats, and a huge array of minibeasts, as well as deer, fox and even otters have been spotted here.

Luggiewatch - if you have not heard of them before - is a wonderful community of local people that care about the environment we live in and promote community spirit through looking after and enhancing our Luggie and its' surroundings. 


Wednesday 23rd June
